Kaitlin, Tenneka, and Nayo are exactly the type of teachers you'd want watching a young child from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. every day. They make learning fun and enjoyable. For example, they brought worms to class when it was raining to let the children learn about nature and the elements. Also, they are constantly baking things in class—stirring, measuring, taking turns—working on hand-eye coordination, fine motor skills, and the art of cooperating with others. The energy and patience of these teachers (overseeing a group of 2-year-olds each day is not easy!) astounds and amazes me. Plus, they're always cheerful, even turning tasks that kids don't want to do—like cleaning up—into enjoyable activities by singing a wacky song and finding new ways to be creative. Matthew is learning every day, and the beauty is he doesn't realize it because he's having so much fun.

Jack, my 4-year-old, is equally lucky. Jen, Jessica Marjie, and Rhea make preschool interesting, fun, and educational. Jack has learned so much in the year he's been in their class—writing his name, recognizing letters and numbers, learning the social skills needed for a lifetime.
